What Disease?

KJV, RSV, NASB, NKJV have
“leprous disease, leprosy.”

NIV has “infectious skin disease.”

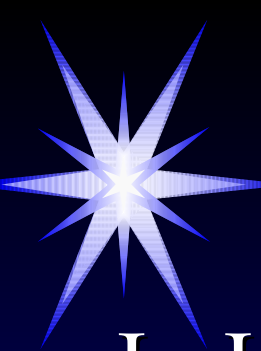
Easy to

The description includes spreading
mildew in garments (13:47-59) and
houses (14:33-53).

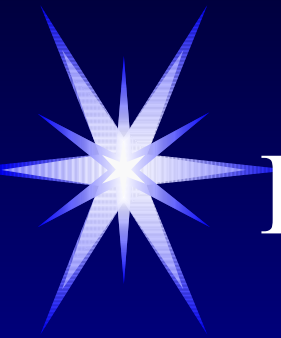
The same word, translated “leprosy,”
is used throughout.

Fundamental idea: spreading surface
infection, usually with discoloration.

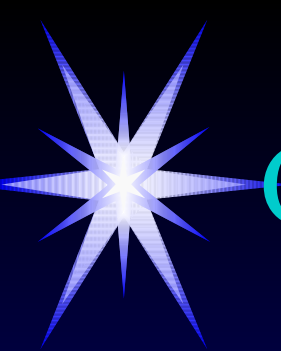

B. Significance of Contagion



Clues about Spiritual Significance

Spreading disorder is the basic violation.

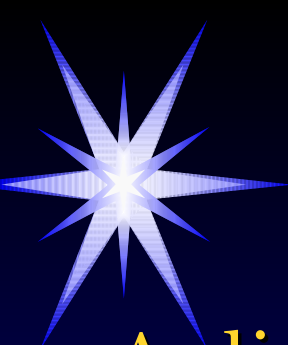
The person is excluded from the community (13:45-46).

Guilt offering required in the process of cleansing a person (14:1-32).

Priest applies blood and oil to the infected person (14:14-18).

Guilt offering

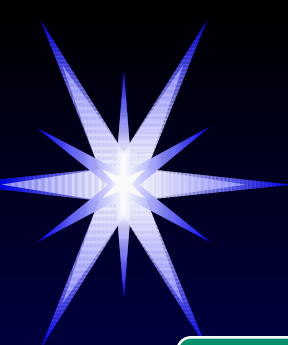
Substitute reconciles

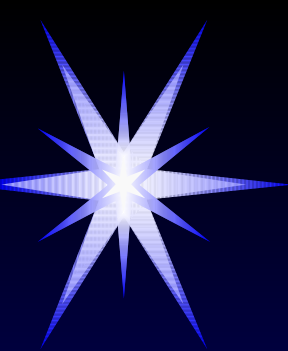




Spiritual Contagion

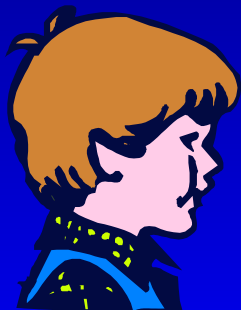
“Bad company corrupts good character” (1 Cor. 15:33; see Prov. 22:24-25).
