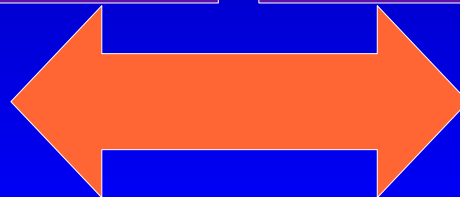




Moral Issues

Moral values as merely feelings arising from accidental evolutionary adaptation for survival.

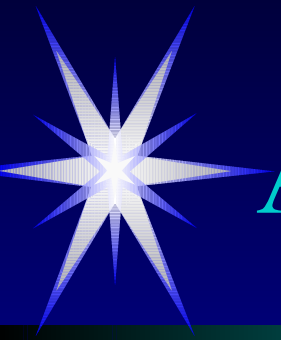
Moral values as transcendent reality.

- Nothing buttery: matter only

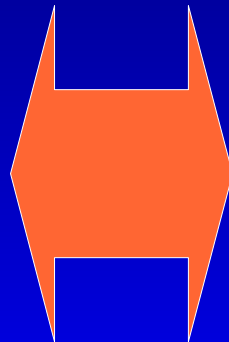


Materialism versus Science

starting assumption

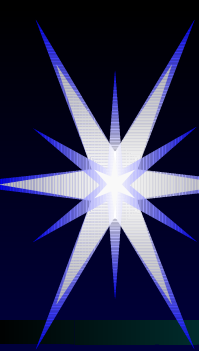
