A. What is Redemptive-Historical Interpretation?



Redemptive-historical interpretation is

interpretation of the Bible that pays attention to and takes seriously the historical unfolding of God's plan for redemption and his progressive revelation through distinct periods of history.

Christ in Redemptive History

The Bible unfolds the meaning of the person and the work of Christ in the context of its exposition of the unfolding of redemption in <u>history</u>.

Irenaeus (c. 130-c. 202): Adam and Christ

- Johannes Oecolampadius (1482-1531): patterns leading to fulfillment in Christ
- Heinrich Bullinger (1504-1575): covenants

Johannes Cocceius (1603-1669): covenant theology

Westminster Confession of Faith (1646): covenant of works and covenant of grace, in two administrations (OT and NT)

In him we have obtained an inheritance, having been predestined according to the purpose of him who <u>works all things</u> according to the counsel of his will,






Adam and Christ: Covenant of Works and Covenant of Grace






Relations within God
